This approach ensures that you get the "must-have" shots: the family lineup, the perfectly centered kiss at the altar, the gazed-into-each-other's-eyes portrait. The photographer takes an active role, directing your hands, fixing your dress, and telling you exactly where to look. This is ideal for couples who feel awkward in front of a camera and want clear guidance. It guarantees a level of polish and perfection. If you are worried about double chins or messy hair, a traditional approach offers a safety net because the photographer is constantly curating the image to make you look your absolute best.

On the other end of the spectrum is the documentary, or photojournalistic, style. This approach is all about capturing the moment as it happens, without interference. The photographer becomes a fly on the wall, documenting the laughter, the tears, and the unplanned chaos that makes a wedding memorable. You won't find many posed shots here; instead, you will see the groom's nervous fidgeting, the flower girl asleep under a table, or the wind whipping your veil across your face. This style prioritizes emotion over perfection. It tells the raw, unscripted story of the day. The challenge often lies in deciding between the two, but modern photography rarely sits strictly in one camp. Many professionals blend these styles, offering a "hybrid" approach. They might shoot the ceremony and reception in a documentary style to capture the energy and emotion, but then switch to a traditional mode for the family portraits and couple's session. This gives you the best of both worlds: the safety of the posed shots and the heart of the candid ones. It is important to discuss this balance with potential vendors. Ask to see

full galleries, not just highlights, to understand how they handle different parts of the day.

Ultimately, your choice should be guided by how you want to remember your wedding. Do you want a record of how perfect everything looked, or do you want a reminder of how everything felt? Traditional photography captures the beauty of the event; documentary photography captures the soul of it. There is no right answer, only the answer that resonates with your heart. Take your time, look at the images that make you feel something, and trust your gut.
